Chopin Preludes, Op. 28, short solo piano pieces written between

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1834–39 by Frederic Chopin and intended as explorations of the characters of various keys. The iconic examples of such works are those of Johann Sebastian Bach appearing in his The Well-Tempered Clavier, much of which was composed in the 1720s.

The Prelude, Op. 28, No. 1, played on the piano, is the first of Chopin's preludes. It was published in 1839 and dedicated to Camille Pleyel. Pianist Vladimir de Pachmann noted this prelude as "The first one is in a style that reminds one very forcibly of Schumann."

Some argue that Chopin's arrangement is conducive to a performance of the entire Op. 28 as a whole, which might have been Chopin's intent (Alfred Cortot was the first to do this in 1926). Others point out (like Marilyn Meier in her dissertation) that Chopin himself never played more than four in any given sitting.

Now, let's have a look at his Piano Prelude No. 15 in D flat major, Op. 28. This Prelude, more commonly known for 'Raindrop', belongs to a body of works by Chopin called The Preludes, which was written between 1835 and 1838 to then be published in 1839. The 'Raindrop' Prelude is one of the longest at 9 bars, and in it we can see a clearly worked out ternary ABA structure with a contrasting B section in C# minor.

F. Chopin's Piano Prelude No, 15 in D flat major Analysis

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Frederic Chopin(1810-1849) wrote the Prelude in E Major, op. 28, no. 9, in the mid 1830's, near the beginning of the Romantic era.

Frédéric Chopin's Prelude In D \flat Major Op. 28 No. 15 is also known as The Raindrop Prelude. This piece is referred to as The Raindrop Prelude because of the persistent repeated notes which sound like rain falling.

Chopin's 24 Préludes, Op. 28, are a set of short pieces for the piano, one in each of the twenty-four keys, originally published in 1839. The French edition was dedicated to the piano-maker

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and publisher Camille Pleyel, who had commissioned the work for 2,000 francs (equivalent to nearly \$30,000 in present day).
